t. Brigid. 'The Mary of the Gael's as she has been known to generations of Irish people celebrates her Feast Day on February 1st.

She is remembered for her hospitality and hard work, as a woman of God and a woman of the people.

Her powerful personality appealed to all, from those on high to the humble beggar.

She was born near Dundalk A.D. c454 to a pagan chieftan father (Dubthach) and a Christian slave mother (Broicsech). Brigid's mother was sent away but Brigid later returned to take her mothers place in the usual round of bondswoman's duties:- including minding livestock, serving meals etc. She was given charge of the dairy but gave much of the produce away to the poor

which enraged her father. In time the father tried to arrange a marriage for his daughter.

She choose a life of prayer, service to God and to the poor. She became the first nun in Ireland, forming the first religious community for women in Ireland in Ardagh, but Brigid later moved to what is now Kildare, her most famous where she founded a double monastery with the assistance of bishop Conleth. Brigid and seven others completed their novitiate there and went to make their final vows to St. Mel, bishop of Armagh and nephew of St. Patrick.

Her convent grew and she travelled all over Ireland, she tended the sick, built schools, made vestments etc. She was so loved by bishops, priests, chieftans that she became known as 'The Mary of the Gaels' She died

A.D. 525 shortly after her 70th birthday, her sisters kept a fire burning in an enclosure at her Kildare convent for centuries.

Saint Brigid is the patroness of cattle; infants; midwives; blacksmiths; poets, nuns & students. An old tradition on St.

Brigid's eve is to leave a white cloth or scarf outside on a hedge or bush to be blessed by St. Brigid. Known as a 'Bratog Bride' in Irish folklore it is used as a cure for headaches, sore throats and a cure for sick cattle.

Prayer to Saint Brigid. You were a woman of peace. You brought harmony where there was conflict. You brought light to the darkness. You brought hope to the downcast. May the mantle of your peace cover those who are troubled and anxious, and may peace be firmly rooted in our hearts and in our world.

Blessing of Candles

TUESDAY February 2nd:

Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. This feast is a combined remembrance of the Son & the Mother and celebrated as World Day for Consecrated Life, in the Church calendar

It is known as candlemas day. This vear Your Candles will be blessed virtually at the 11.00 am Mass on Tuesday morning. You don't need wax candles, use any candles you have. On this day candles are blessed for use throughout the year. The Flame: - Symbolises Christ's Divinity; The wick symbolises Christ's soul and the wax symbolises Christ's body.

Blessing of Throats

This year **Blessing** of throats will take place virtually at the 11.00 am Mass on Wednesday.



Saint Blaise died around 315 He was Bishop of Sebaste, martyred in Armenia. Tradition states he was a physican before becoming a Bishop. Since the eight century St. Blaise has been venerated as the Patron for sore throats and sick cattle.

Normally using two crossed and unlighted candles, the priest touches the throat of each person saving: Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop & martyr, may God deliver you from all ailments of the throat and from every other illness. In the name of the Father Amen.
