LIVING OUT THE CALL

Once again we hear this weekend the continuing stories of how Jesus called people to follow him. It is after all what he was about, calling people, bringing them close, sharing the message of the Good News and leading them closer in their relationship with God. His Father, also called people to his service, to be his messengers. That's the story of Isaiah in our first reading.

But the important part of the story for us today is that like the Prophet Isaiah, like the fishermen that Jesus called, is that they were supported in their mission, their call, their work. They are never abandoned even when things get tough or in their case life threatening. God is always faithful to those who answer his call, who respond to his invitation and he reassures them that he will accompany them always.

Each of us are called. Everyone of us has been invited into the same relationship with God, but it is not an isolated relationship of God and me alone. That relationship is being part of or a member of a community. We are made members of that community and share the relationship of being one community in faith, through Baptism.

We too are called to be the Lord's messengers. The ones who are invited to help better the lives of others, offering support and consolation and also to have the courage to recognise we are not islands, that we do not journey through life on our own, that we are accompanied on our journey with one another but ultimately, the Lord himself journeys with us, he never abandons us, no matter how difficult things may seem.

International Day of Prayer and Awareness against Human Trafficking is on February 8th, first observed in 2015.


In 1992 Pope John Paul 11 instituted the *World Day of the Sick* to be held each year on the commemoration of **Our Lady of Lourdes on February 11th.**

In his message for **World Day of the Sick, 2022** Pope Francis focuses on Jesus's words to the Apostles:

'Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful' (Lk 6:36)
Standing beside those who suffer on a path of charity.

This *World Day of the Sick* day is an opportunity to devote special attention to the sick and to those who care for them within families, healthcare settings and communities. This year we especially remember those who have suffered, and continue to suffer, the effects of the worldwide coronavirus pandemic. In the theme from the Gospel passage Jesus criticises the hypocrisy of those who fail to practice what they preach (*Mt. 23:1-12*)
